According to the extensive literature on the subject, humanity has entered the age of Anthropocene, so called because homo sapiens has demonstrated that it can act as a geological force capable of profoundly changing the face of the planet. Virtually, today there is no place or phenomenon on earth that does not leave traces, directly or indirectly, of the pervasive human transformative action. The new era we are living is changing the deep structure of our planet to a formerly unknown degree. Thus, the catastrophic consequences of the human impact on life on this planet command a fundamental change of our attitude.

From this viewpoint, how to define the place of humans in natural world? What is the meaning of nature? How we are to be regarded in relation to the other natural beings? How to respond to problems facing us, now and in the future, such as environmental degradation, climate changes, overpopulation and overconsumption, destruction of natural resources, coexistence among different natural beings and different cultures? How can technology, humanities and the arts address this situation? Is it possible to imagine a no longer human-based future state of our planet?

These are just some questions the international conference tries to answer, along with some reflections coming from different fields of knowledge such as philosophy, arts, science, technology.
